Many of our students (26) also did really well and made it into the Far North Finals and achieved outstanding results - Max, Caitlyn, Lexi, Lily, Shayla-Jade, Dylan, Zion, Kaylee and Te Wai all made it into the Top 10 with Soli running an incredible race and coming first in the 10 year old race.

Well done to all our students for the mahi you put in and the success that you achieved.

Poetry Slam day was absolutely brilliant. It was an event of such high quality. Students who wrote their own poetry and then performed it in front of the whole school. The work the students had put into this event was evident. If you missed this the top performers will be at the next Celebration Assembly and we also have some great footage on FaceBook. Again a big 'well done' to our awesome tamariki. Thanks to Kohu Inch who came up with this idea. So cool seeing our students enjoying poetry. Last week five Board of Trustee members spent the day in Auckland listening and observing to students, teachers and leaders of the Manaiakalani Cluster Schools. It was a really interesting day where we learnt in greater detail what it would mean to join this cluster of schools in their outreach programme. One of my burning questions was 'Why do they want to extend their model to other schools?' The answer was simple. The data stacks up and the philanthropic groups who finance the cluster have said they will support Manaiakalani to extend this model. They want other schools in lower decile schools to share this success. It is not small amounts of putea, over the last seven years they have received over 14 million dollars. Their model is digital and very similar to what we are already doing but with better resources and a larger group of teachers working together. It was the collaborative approach of everyone sharing and working together that really stood out to me. It was not about one school saying we are better than the other, it was about all the schools working together to make great schools for all the students.

We did have some good conversations over the negative perspectives some parents hold and voice in regards to the digital environments we have in our communities. All the schools have 'blended environments' where both traditional and modern tools are used. Just like at Mangonui they use both the pencil and the netbook, sports and cultural events are also extremely important. Like Mangonui School they have some people who suggest that going digital is throwing the kids a chromebook and expecting learning to happen. We know it will not...but.... having a combination of both will. Screen time is no different to book time. When was the last time a child developed cross eyes from reading too many books or square eyes from watching too much T.V? We just know that balance is important and we take that really seriously at Mangonui. Anyone who suggests Mangonui School does not have balance needs to come and spend time looking in our classrooms!

What I saw in Auckland was really exciting. I look at what Mangonui already does and can see that this will strengthen our systems and make learning even better for our children. Our curriculum is based around our local context, our land, our sea and our people and this digital ingredient will only enhance what we do. This week some of us are heading to Ohaeawai School who is on their third year as a Manaiakalani Cluster school. This again will give us more detail of what we can expect if we become part of this cluster.

I gave out three awards over the last two weeks to our students. Two of whom are learning to use mistakes as learning tool rather than see it as 'an upsetting experience'. If we teach our students this important lesson they will be more willing to take risks with their learning. Remember the days when the teacher yelled at us for getting it wrong! One award went to Peyton who simply is fitting in really well to her new school - she has the kaitiaki sorted! Well done.

We had a lovely visit from Duffy Hero June Pitman-Hayes who is the author of the book Tawhirimatea. Thank you for visiting our kura this week.
