is not always a favourite with everyone, it is hard work. We need to really support our children to 'give it a go' even if it is 'hard work'. As parents we need to be careful that we do not cotton wool our children or attempt to make their world perfect, we do not want to set them up to fail.

Last week the Community of Learning Cluster for the Far North 'Kanui Ako' (which Mangonui is a part of with twenty other Far North schools) had a presentation by the Manaiakalani Cluster Outreach programme. The Manaiakalani Cluster was founded in South Auckland in 2007. The group of schools have worked together to lift student achievement in some of the poorest areas in New Zealand and have had huge success. Their achievement has been followed closely by the Auckland University Woolf Fisher Research Institute which has, over time, documented this success with a focus on data. They want to expand their model and offer this to other similar schools in New Zealand. They have over 50 schools already sign up with a cluster in the Kaikohe area that is doing extremely well and benefiting hugely from this relationship. This model fits very closely with our Mangonui model, in particular the digital focus that we have been taking over the last five years. Many schools from the Kanui Ako Cluster have indicated that they are also interested in participating in this wonderful opportunity for Far North schools. As a fellow Principal stated "It is like free Professional Development". As far as keeping our identity this should not be an issue as we have our package and point of difference - connection to the sea, authentic learning, water safe, water fun initiative, Cultural identity and a deep focus on having great teachers. It weaves easily into the Strategic Plan that we are now working on for 2018-2020. It is a really exciting opportunity. The Board of Trustees have decided to travel to Auckland to take a look and explore for themselves next week. The Outreach programme have offered an opportunity to us to learn more about what they offer and how this will work at our school. The Board will no doubt report back on what they found out and how they believe this will fit for our school and whanau. 

#### To: School Newsletter

Having a sore throat is very common. The discomfort can range from a scratchy feeling to severe pain. Sore throats are usually caused by virus infections like colds or the flu.

If your child has a sore throat, please get it checked straight away. They are at risk of a serious but preventable illness called rheumatic fever.

Call your public health nurse on 08005374342 when you are unable to get to the doctor.

Sometimes a sore throat is caused by Streptococcus bacteria (strep throat) which throat can lead to rheumatic fever if not treated quickly with antibiotics. Rheumatic fever is a serious illness because it can cause heart damage.

Scarlet fever can also lead to rheumatic fever - and to other illnesses, like pneumonia or infections. The main symptom of scarlet fever is a red rash that feels rough. It usually begins on your chest, spreading to your neck, abdomen and arms. People with scarlet fever may have flushed checks and a red or white 'strawberry tongue'.

If you or this type of rash and a sore throat, get to the doctor quickly so they can check it out

Having a sore throat is also one of the symptoms of glandular fever – along with fever and swollen glands in the neck. Other symptoms of glandular fever include headache, feeling generally unwell, joint pains, tiredness, and loss of appetite.

Glandular fever generally isn't serious but it can cause tiredness and loss of energy for a longer period – even up to a few months.

If you think you or a family member may have glandular fever, you should see your doctor.




